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Kaiser Health Tracking Poll: Election 2008

December 2007

Methodology

The *Kaiser Health Tracking Survey: Election 2008* was designed and analyzed by public opinion researchers at the Kaiser Family Foundation led by Mollyann Brodie, Ph.D. and Elizabeth Hamel. The survey was conducted from November 28 through December 9, 2007, among a nationally representative random sample of 1,221 adults ages 18 and older, including 341 self-identified Republicans, 398 self-identified Democrats, and 378 self-identified independents. Telephone interviews were carried out in English and Spanish by Princeton Survey Research Associates.

The margin of sampling error for the full survey is plus or minus 3 percentage points; for results based on subgroups, the margin of sampling error is higher. Note that sampling error is only one of many potential sources of error in this or any other public opinion poll.

Values less than 0.5% are indicated by an asterisk (*).

"VOL" indicates that a response was volunteered by respondent, not an explicitly offered choice.

Due to rounding, percentages may not add to 100.

¹ Questions 1a, 1b, and 2b come from a parallel survey of a nationally representative random sample of 2,005 adults interviewed by telephone between November 28 and December 10, 2007, which has a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points. These questions were asked on a separate survey because of the desire to track opinions about the most important problem for the president and Congress to address, as well as the issues people most want to hear candidates discuss, and the public's top issues in their choice for president. In order to avoid biasing answers to any of these questions by asking them all of the same group, and to preserve a large enough sample for subgroup analysis, the questions were asked of separate samples on separate surveys.
